



2025 : AN ANNIVERSARY SEASON IN THE LOIRE VALLEY

2025 promises to be an exciting year for the Loire Valley region, which is celebrating not one, not two, but three big anniversaries this year: the 25th anniversary of the Loire Valley as a UNESCO World Heritage Site, the 20th anniversary of the 'La Loire à Vélo' or «Loire by bike» cycle route and the 15th anniversary of the 'Gastronomic meal of the French'

30 November 2000 is a date engraved in the local tuffeau stone. A date that marks – at an unique time – the official classification of the Loire valley as a *'Living Cultural Landscape'*. 25 years on and **the Loire Valley** is set to celebrate the **174 kilometres stretching from Sully-sur-Loire to Chalonnes-sur-Loire**, listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site. A Loire Valley renowned for its **exceptional Renaissance heritage**, spectacular **landscapes** and **majestic river which bear witness to the harmony and interaction between man and nature and the vineyards and winnegrowers that produce fine Loire wines. The region's special UNESCO year is also one of celebration for two great listed cathedrals, Chartres Cathedral and Bourges Cathedral**, as well as for the **Neuvy-Saint-Sépulchre basilica**, a replica of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem. So many reasons to visit and discover this remarkable region!

Spring 2005 saw the opening of the first section of La Loire à Vélo, linking the two regions that own and finance this cycle route, the first of its kind in France. Today, La Loire à Vélo is a well-known route throughout France and beyond, attracting almost two million cycle tourists every year and generating €55.6 million in economic benefits. A Loire success story that is the pride and joy of both the locals and the regions that developed it.

In 2010, UNESCO officially classified the 'Gastronomic meal of the French' as an element of intangible cultural heritage, as nominated by the European Institute for the History and Culture of Foods (IEHCA) in Tours. The aim of this listing is to protect this customary social practice: togetherness, the pleasure of taste, sharing memorable moments and the pairing of wine and local produce.

These anniversaries and a programme of festivals, activities and events, organised by the Loire Valley region, serve to transmit and nurture **the Loire Valley's values of humanism** and affirm its standing as **an authentic land of Renaissance**.

25 YEARS OF THE LOIRE VALLEY AS A UNESCO WORLD HERITAGE SITE, A land of eternal Renaissance

Known affectionately as the 'Garden of France', the Loire Valley is a region rich in historical and natural heritage. A region traversed by the Loire and irrigated by its tributaries which have shaped the landscape and encouraged the movement and circulation of men and women, goods and ideas... A region synonymous with the French Renaissance and famed for its châteaux, illustrious characters and 'art de vivre'.

Alittle history: Medieval fortresses, royal châteaux, Renaissance residences, cathedrals, abbeys... More than three centuries of prolific developments in art and architecture that gave birth to the 'French art de vivre'. Where did it all begin? With a military disaster: the Battle of Agincourt (October 1415), a defeat that forced the King of France, Charles VII, driven out of Paris by the English, to take refuge on the banks of the Loire. The Loire Valley, with its river running through it, was the main means of communication between the Mediterranean, Burgundy and the Lyonnais region. The nobility forced to take refuge here liked it so much that they decided to stay, and once peace had been restored, economic prosperity and the development of the arts gave rise to an unprecedented frenzy of building.

TODAY, THE LOIRE VALLEY BOASTS:

- A tradition of inland waterways kept alive by nature lovers, who help locals and visitors discover the Loire, its tributaries the Cher, Indre and Vienne and their biodiversity of migratory birds and beavers, wild plants and sandbanks. In the regions of Sologne and Touraine and the Orléans Forest, the river, lakes and forests form a breathtaking landscape that is characteristic of the heart of France, its history and geography.
- More than 100 châteaux open to visitors a concentration of Renaissance châteaux not found anywhere else in the world. It is here that the French court reigned for almost three centuries!
- Some 30 garden attractions, from the classic Renaissance gardens of Villandry to the avant-garde gardens of Chaumont-sur-Loire. Plus a wealth of gardens designed by gardening enthusiasts keen to share their expertise: Sasnières, Roquelin, Valmer, La Bussière, Les Grandes-Bruyères, Talcy and the garden village of Chédigny.
- A plethora of famous figures who have left their mark on the Loire Valley, including Leonardo da Vinci, Joan of Arc, Olivier Debré, Alexander Calder, Max Ernst, Balzac, Rabelais and Ronsard.
- The third largest vineyard in France, with 26 appellations, producing a range of white, red, rosé and sparkling Loire wines.

To celebrate this very special milestone year, 'Mission Val de Loire', which is responsible for retaining the Loire Valley's UNESCO label, and the Region are organising a series of events centred on the Loire's inland waterways (see agenda at the end of this press kit).

OUTSTANDING UNIVERSAL VALUE

On **30 November 2000**, 174 kilometres of the Loire Valley – from Sully-sur-Loire to Chalonnes-sur-Loire – was listed as a World Heritage Site in recognition of its 'living cultural landscapes'. It is one of the largest listed sites in France.

In its approval of the Loire Valley's nomination file, UNESCO cites the region's outstanding universal value: "a cultural landscape formed by many centuries of interaction between the river, the land that it irrigates and the populations established there throughout history" in accordance with three criteria:


- The quality of its architectural heritage and urban sites: Nowhere else in Europe can you find towns and villages of such outstanding quality of architectural heritage as those along the Loire or such a density of Renaissance châteaux.
- The landscape illustrates the **ideals of the Renaissance, the Age of Enlightenment** on European thought and design, with Leonardo da Vinci as the figurehead.
- -The landscapes **bear witness to a harmonious development between humankind and its environment.** Although no longer the "wild river" that people often describe it as, the Loire remains remarkably naturally beautiful.





LA LOIRE À VÉLO, A 20-YEAR-OLD SUCCESS STORY IN THE LOIRE VALLEY!

At the end of 1994, the Centre-Val de Loire and Pays de la Loire regions signed an interregional agreement for a cycle tourism project, originally entitled 'Vélo Loire', an alien concept in the tourism landscape at the time. A group of elected representatives and engineers undertook a research trip to Germany to explore the 'Donau-Radweg' (Danube Cycle Path). And 10 years later, in 2005, the two regions opened the first section of 'La Loire à Vélo' − from Tours to Angers − establishing a link between the two and marking the start of this pioneering cycle route. Today, 'La Loire à Vélo' is a well-known route throughout France and beyond, attracting almost two million cycle tourists every year and generating €55.6 million in economic benefits. A Loire success story that is the pride and joy of both the locals and the regions that developed it.



WHY CHOSE LA LOIRE À VÉLO?

- Because it is **a safe and signposted 900-km route**: 620 km between Cuffy and the Atlantic Ocean and 280 km of loops and variants. Roads shared with traffic and dedicated cycle paths alternate along a predominately flat route, making it accessible to all.
- Because almost **the entire route is accessible by train**. And because every summer from mid-June to mid-September the *'Loire à Vélo'* train includes in the price of your ticket free and secure transportation of your bike in specially equipped carriages. No longer any need to cycle the route there and back, instead you can choose to do it in several sections

- Because there's always something to see along La Loire à Vélo: historical UNESCO-listed heritage sites, towns and villages, beautiful Loire landscapes of vineyards, crop fields, gardens, troglodyte dwellings, the Loire River, renowned for its very special light, and birds nesting on the sandbanks.
- Because 900 tourism professionals with the 'Accueil Vélo' label are true experts in welcoming cycle tourists: accommodation providers (hotels, campsites and B&Bs) and bike hire companies (luggage transfer, bike hire from A to B). This label, created in the Loire Valley region, guarantees specific services: secure bike storage, luggage transfer, a hearty breakfast, a bike wash station...
- Because La Loire à Vélo connects with other European and regional cycle routes: EuroVélo 6, linking La Loire à Vélo to the Black Sea, EuroVélo 3, linking Norway to Spain via the Loiret, and regional routes such as L'Indre à Vélo (between southern Touraine and Indre), Cœur de France à Vélo and Saint-Jacques à Vélo. A total of 5,200 km of cycle routes and loops.
- Because it's easy to plan your trip using the website, which features useful information, suggested itineraries and contact details for local agencies specialising in bespoke cycling holidays.
- **Because La Loire à Vélo's passport,** stamped by tourist offices along the way, is a great souvenir of your trip along the route.

As a key part of the 'Les Echappées à Vélo' program, many events are organised to help you discover and explore cycle routes and loops (see agenda at the end of this press kit).





WINE TOURISM & GASTRONOMY

GASTRONOMIC MEAL OF THE FRENCH

UNESCO's inclusion of the 'Gastronomic meal of the French' on its Intangible Cultural Heritage list in 2010 - the fruit of the labour of the European Institute for the History and Culture of Foods (IEHCA), in co-operation with the University of Tours protects and promotes the spirit and values of the 'Garden of France'.

The 'Gastronomic meal of the French' is defined as a meal that brings people together to celebrate important events, with a choice of good-quality products, preferably of local origin. It 'emphasises togetherness, the pleasure of taste and the balance between human beings and the products of nature'. Diners practise 'the art of good eating and drinking', with the emphasis on 'the pairing of food and wine', 'the setting of a beautiful table' and 'specific actions during consumption, such as smelling and tasting items at the table'. 2025 will therefore also be the year for celebrating the wine and cuisine of Rabelais' beloved 'Garden of France'. Many banquets and picnics will be organised as part of the 'Nouvelles Renaissance(S]' season, and the IEHCA will be publishing a collective work on the 'Gastronomy of the Garden of France'.

The inventory of the culinary heritage of the Centre-Val de Loire region lists 110 original products that are emblematic of our terroirs. They exemplify well the good quality of life that has long been - rightfully - associated with our region. The products and specialities listed include:

- Galette de pomme de terre (potato puff pastry) from Berry
- Cotignac d'Orléans (sweet quince paste treat), the Mentchikoff (praline and meringue chocolate) from Chartres and the Forestine (smooth almond and hazelnut praline-filled sweet) from Bourges
- Andouille (smoked pork sausage) and andouillettes (andouille sausage dish) from the Loire Valley, rillons (pork belly dish) and rillettes (pork pâté) from Touraine and pâté de Pâques (Easter pâté) from Berry
- Goat's cheese with 5 PDOs and 26 appellations
- Fruit and vegetables from the 'Garden of France': dried pears from Touraine, cherries from Orléans, strawberries from Sologne, asparagus and beetroot from the Loiret, winter squash from Berry
- Fish from the Loire river: pike, shad, eel, carp etc.





At the end of 2024, Maison Martin-Pouret, the last remaining master vinegar maker in Orléans, opened new workshops. The aim? To offer visitors a unique immersive experience to discover the secrets behind the production of vinegar using the Orléans method, a method that has been successfully combining tradition and savoir-faire since 1797. The +? Guided tours and cookery classes to learn how to use these delicious condiments and prepare some unusual recipes, including chocolate cake with raspberry vinegar and vinegar mocktails. Something that's sure to surprise the taste buds!

VINORIZON: VISIT THE VINEYARDS BY SCOOTER!

In the Sancerre region, Pierre Durand, a fourth-generation winegrower, is offering scooter tours of the vineyards, with stop-offs to try out the region's signature products!

The concept is simple: all-terrain electric scooter rides that allow visitors to explore the magnificent vineyard landscapes of Crézancy-en-Sancerre. The tours on offer promise a unique experience, combining effort and comfort.

The three routes devised by Pierre Durand range from 12 km (1 hour) to Crézancy and 20 km (2 hours 30 mins) to Sancerre, with gourmet stops along the way: 'La chèvrerie des Gallands' farm to sample the 'Crottins de Chavignol' (a soft, crumbly goat's cheese), tastings of Domaine Durand wines... The perfect way to visit the vineyards!

The programme of simple, yet stylish activities such as unusual vineyard tours, 'Bike escape & chic picnic' experiences and 'Ceramics & terroirs' workshops.

In Tours, the capital of regional cuisine and close to Rabelais country, Sheena has launched 'Food Tours', a concept that serves as an introduction to the local cuisine.

PDO Saint-Maure de Touraine or Selles-sur-Cher cheese, Rillons de Tours or Rillettes, Poires Tapées, Bourgueil wines and the winegrower's tart made with it... These are just some of the many local delights to be discovered and savoured on a unique walking tour of Tours which will reveal all the culinary secrets of this medieval city, the former capital of France. Those wishing to try their hand at preparing a Touraine dish can do so under the expert guidance of a local chef in one of the cookery classes on offer. Each tour ends with an enjoyable group meal.











CHÂTEAU D'AZAY-LE-RIDEAU CELEBRATES ITS 500TH ANNIVERSARY

Château d'Azay-le-Rideau is an architectural masterpiece, a monument symbolic of the French Renaissance, both in France and abroad. A subtle blend of French tradition and innovative Italian-style decorative features, Azay is an icon of the new art of building from the 16th century and romanticism in the Loire Valley. In 2025, Château d'Azay-le-Rideau will be celebrating its 500th anniversary with an extensive programme of events and festivities: exhibitions, plays, immersive shows, illuminations, concerts, family activities and talks.

BOURGES, EUROPEAN CAPITAL OF CULTURE 2028

The city of Bourges and the Loire Valley Region are not only aiming to host a major cultural event, but also to take advantage of this exceptional opportunity to initiate a profound transformation of its territory by and with its partners and the inhabitants. Bourges 2028 wants to be a model of cultural city committed to ecological, social and economic transitions around strong axes:

- Bourges must be the first European Capital of Culture low carbon because the climate emergency must provoke a response from all actors.

REOPENING OF CHARTRES CATHEDRAL'S TREASURY IN SAINT-PIAT CHAPEL

Almost a quarter of a century after its closure in the early 2000s, the cathedral's treasury is once again open in the fully restored Saint-Piat Chapel. Following a lengthy process of research and restoration, some 150 objects are now on display in all their glory in the upper chapel, the chapter house and the two towers of the 14th-century building. For the first time ever, both floors of the chapel are open seven days a week, for visitors to wander at their leisure or discover on a guided tour. The +? The light from the stained glass windows by Korean artist Bang Hai Ja in the chapter house and the provision of disabled access to the treasury.

CHRISTMAS EVENTS IN THE LOIRE VALLEY

Around twenty years ago, the biggest châteaux in the Loire Valley region joined forces to come up with a special Christmas offering for visitors to the châteaux during the festive season. The aim was to avoid going down the traditional Christmas markets route of Eastern France, and instead develop a unique concept fit for an equally unique heritage. Every year since, the Loire Valley châteaux have been brought to life with the magic of Christmas, with each château embracing its own relevant theme (flower arrangements and decorated tables, old-fashioned toys, nativity scenes, nature, light, contemporary art, sweet treats etc.). The decorations change every year and are complemented by an enchanting programme of activities and events (workshops, shows, concerts, evening events). The +? 'POTAGERS DE FRANCE': A NETWORK OF REMARKABLE KITCHEN GARDENS OPEN TO VISITORS

Today more than ever, visitors are taking a keen interest in nutrition and well-being. The Loire Valley, also known as the 'Garden of France', cultivates this 'art de vivre', and nine fruit and vegetable gardens rooted in the region are members of the kitchen garden network: the châteaux of Chenonceau, La Bourdaisière, La Bussière, Chambord, Valmer, Villandry and Chaumont-sur-Loire, the Presbytère garden at Chédigny and 'Parc Floral d'Orléans' botanical garden. These remarkable gardens all have three core values in common: the promotion of the specific plant heritage of the kitchen garden, the transmission of gardening know-how and, finally, the promotion of the fruit and vegetable garden as a place for innovation (for example, the tomato festival at Château de la Bourdaisière).



A RELAXING INTERLUDE IN THE GARDENS OF CHÂTEAU DE MEUNG-SUR-LOIRE


Château de Meung-sur-Loire has designed a new, unique garden walk, along which visitors are invited to stop off, sit back and relax and enjoy some music, and even read a book! In the centre of squares planted with rosebushes bearing the names of authors (Jehan de Meung ('The Romance of the Rose'), François Villon, Gaston Couté, to name but a few) are deckchairs and a box containing books by the authors in question. Ambient music and the sound of a fountain add a poetic touch to this delightful experience.

ROYAL CHÂTEAU OF AMBOISE: A SEASON IN THE GARDEN

At the very end of the 15th century, King Charles VIII (1470-1498) commissioned the creation of a vast Italian-style pleasure garden at Château d'Amboise. Today, unique terraced gardens are laid out around an amphitheatre of greenery, affording exceptional views of the Loire Valley. In 2025, 'Fondation Saint-Louis', non-profit heritage conservation organisation created in 1974, will continue to upgrade the terrace of Naples by planting Mediterranean species (lavender, sage, santolina, rosemary etc.) in the lawn flowerbeds, in the style of Renaissance gardens. A new garden is to be created on the 'Seven Virtues' terrace near the Saint-Hubert chapel, where Leonardo da Vinci's tomb can be found. The purpose of this new garden is to create a new vantage point from which visitors can admire the panoramic views.

PARC FLORAL D'APREMONT-SUR-ALLIER: MORE THAN JUST A BOTANICAL PARADISE

Designed in 1977 by Gilles de Brissac, this botanical garden, designated a 'Jardin Remarquable' (Remarkable Garden), is an ode to travel. Featuring a Chinese bridge, a Turkish pavilion, a Russianinspired belvedere and a collection of trees from all over the world, the site extends over almost five hectares and is the perfect choice for a beautiful botanical walk. Interested in history? 'Le Grand Départ' (The Great Departure) is an immersive theatre experience that takes visitors on a journey back in time to meet Eugène and Antoinette Schneider, the owners of Château d'Apremont-sur-Allier in the early 20th century. The +? The garden is integrated into a village awarded a coveted 'Plus Beau Village de France' (Most Beautiful Village in France') label and located on the La Loire à Vélo cycle route. Where time stands still on the banks of the Allier.

CHÂTEAU OF TALCY: A SUSTAINABLE ORCHARD

After a year of celebrations in honour of 16th-century French poet Ronsard, which put Château de Talcy – a little jewel in the French Renaissance crown – in the spotlight, it's time to take a closer look at the château's conservatory orchard, which has been awarded the 'Jardin Remarquable' label. The creation of the orchard has restored this large estate to its former 18th-century agricultural role. The +? No chemicals have been used in any of the château's gardens since 2008. A donkey and a handful of Sologne sheep graze the pastures.

The Loire Valley is criss-crossed by **six national routes and two** *EuroVélo* **routes (EV3 and EV6)**, including France's oldest cycle route, *La Loire à Vélo*. This easy-to-navigate **900 km** route follows the Loire through a region listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site. The **Orléans-Tours-Nantes-Le Croisic train line** operates along the *La Loire à Vélo* cycle route, and from June to September, all trains on the line are equipped with **50 to 83 spaces for bikes**, making it easier for cyclists to get around the region. For even greater comfort and convenience, more than **1,000 professionals with the 'Accueil Vélo' (Bike Friendly) label** along the entire route (accommodation providers, bike hire companies, tourist sites etc.), located no more than 5 km from the route, offer special services for cycle tourists: secure premises, repair kits etc.

La Loire à Vélo connects with other international routes and a dozen cycle route networks, enabling visitors to discover and explore the region in a different way. These include La Scandibérique (EV3), L'Indre à Vélo, La Vallée du Loir, Saint-Jacques à Vélo via Tours, Saint-Jacques à Vélo via Vézelay, La Véloscénie and Cœur de France à Vélo.



Opening of the Orléans canal greenway

From Orléans to Montargis, a new cycle route along the Orléans canal has just been completed on the long Loiret loop. With its history of inland water shipping, water activities and 'guinguettes' (open-air cafés), this new route offers cyclists a gentle escape from it all in the heart of nature. The route is scheduled to be officially opened on 24 May 2025.

The Loire Valley Region is located **one to two hours from Paris**, with **regular train services** to the big towns in the Centre-Val de Loire region, including Orléans, Tours, Blois, Chartres and Bourges.

Tours is located at **the crossroads of many regional cycle routes.** From *La Loire à Vélo* to *La Scandibérique*, *La Cyclo Bohème*, *Saint-Jacques à Vélo* and *Cœur de France à Vélo*, there are a thousand and one possibilities to get away from it all by bike and discover the region's countryside and vineyards in a different way.

Here is a sample itinerary for a few days in Touraine on La Cyclo Bohème (L'Indre à Vélo):

Day 1: Tours - Chenonceau - Loches (overnight stay in Loches) / 66 km (~ 4 hours 30 mins) of riding through the countryside to discover the region's heritage, with a detour to visit the magnificent Château de Chenonceau

Day 2: Loches - Azay-le-Rideau (overnight stay in Azay) / 60 km (~ 4 hours) on a journey through time, from the Middle Ages to the Renaissance

Day 3: Azay-le-Rideau - Tours via Bréhémont to pick up the La Loire à Vélo route / 44 km (~ 3 hours)



A LONG WEEKEND IN BERRY: SAINT-JACQUES À VÉLO VIA VÉZELAY OVER 4 DAYS



2 hours 30 mins by Intercités train from Paris-Austerlitz

Day 1: Argenton-sur-Creuse - La Châtre (overnight stay in La Châtre) / 50 km (~ 3 hours 15 mins) from the 'Venise of Berry', with its picturesque houses overlooking the river, to La Châtre, passing through countryside that alternates between rolling green hills and dense forests.

Day 2: La Châtre - Saint-Amand-Montrond (overnight stay in Saint-Amand-Montrond) / 59 km (~ 3 hours 30 mins) through the Brenne Regional Nature Park, with its stunning lakes, and charming little villages such as Sarzay and Neuvy-Saint-Sépulchre.

Day 3: Saint-Amand-Montrond - La Guerche-sur-l'Aubois (overnight stay in La Guerche-sur-l'Aubois) / 60 km (~ 3 hours 30 mins) along the quiet, flat Berry Canal path.

Day 4: La Guerche-sur-l'Aubois - La Charité-sur-Loire / $46~\rm km$ (~ 2 hours $45~\rm mins$) along the canal running alongside the Loire.
